## PLEASANT VALLEY TSP REFINEMENT

## **Workshop #2 Comment Summary**

September 25<sup>th</sup>, 2018 Pleasant Valley Elementary School

The second public workshop provided background of the Pleasant Valley TSP Refinement and project progress to-date, presented four alternatives being considered, and presented the analysis results. It sought specific feedback about the alternatives and questions/comments to consider as the team moves toward selecting and refining a preferred alternative. The following summarizes the input received.

Attendees were able to sign-in and provided contact information to be on the project mailing list. They were provided a handout of the alternatives and the screening criteria. Attendees were asked to place a dot to where they lived or worked, shown in Figure 1. As shown, there were a large number of participants from the McKinley Estates subdivision as well as attendees from throughout the study area. Of the comment forms submitted, 21 out of 30 identified themselves as living within Pleasant Valley, the rest identified as not living in Pleasant Valley, unsure, or did not respond.

Attendees were then directed toward the Background, Alternatives, and Alternatives Evaluations boards to learn more about each alternative. Project team members were available to answer questions and write




Figure 2: Comment Form Net Response

comments on large poster boards adjacent to each evaluation criteria. Attendees were also provided a comment sheet asking for likes, dislikes, and questions or comments for each alternative. Likes/dislikes and net response are shown in Figures 1 and 2 and frequent comments or questions are shown in Table 1.

Attendees were also asked to rank the evaluation criteria by level of importance, with 1 being the highest importance and 11 being the lowest importance. Traffic operations (average rank 2.7), property impacts (2.7), safety (3.0), cost (4.1), and environmental (5.4) were the highest-ranked criteria. With the exception of cost, these were also the criteria examined with a higher level of detail by the project team and the criteria that varied more across alternatives. Bicycle/pedestrian (7.2), construction staging (7.6), and town



center access (8.4) were ranked among the lowest. Criteria rankings are shown in more detail below.

Figure 1: Comment Form Responses















































The "Other" ranked as the top priority included "neighborhood cut-through traffic" as the write-in comment. No other write-ins were provided for remaining rankings.
